

Sugar Grove Cemetery,

540 Merril Rd, Sugar Grove

My morbid curiosity always leads me to interesting cemeteries in the many locations I have visited or lived. And Sugar Grove Cemetery was on my list. I learned the cemetery was located next to the *Lakes of Bliss Woods* subdivision when I took my grandchildren to the park there, where we live, and peeking through the shrubbery, I spied tombstones. I soon learned it was a quick walk to the cemetery grounds, and I was on a quest to learn whose grave was the oldest.


With some research, I discovered that the first known burial in Sugar Grove Cemetery is a mystery. It would be appreciated if you or your family could help us solve this mystery.

According to the record: the first Sugar Grove cemetery was

situated, in the low ground east of the residence of P.Y Bliss, on Merrill and Bliss Rd. But, after interring one of the old settlers in a grave half filled with water, the neighbors of the deceased unanimously decided that it would be sacrilege to bury another friend in such a location, and accordingly, a burying ground was purchased a little north of the former position and in a place adapted for the purpose. It is now surrounded by a good stone fence and contains several elegant and costly monuments. (Past and Present of Kane County, IL, 1878)

This is just the beginning of the story. I was told by community members the oldest known grave belonged to Asa McDole, who died 16 September 1839. Upon further research in the cemetery record books, I discovered graves belonging to Mary Jane Gordon McDole, date 181?, Mary Slater Gillett Feb.7,1813, Chas Edward Thompson July 23, 1815, Thompson, Infant 1816, Byron Lombard 1817, Joseph Gillett May 8, 1818, Ebenezer Hadley, Sr. Jan. 11, 1819, Gregory L. Lyman 1819, Wealthy Thompson 1823. All in all, there were 14 graves located there, all before 1839.

Who are these people? Anyone out there related and have a bible registry or genealogy? I have returned to the cemetery with a soft brush and towels to try to locate and clean the moss and elippings off these stones and attempt to take rubbings of those that are nearly impossible to read to see if the cemetery record books are incorrect or are these people, indeed, very early settlers.




